## **Art Shows at the Library**

Portland Library's Mary Flood Room has been home to a series of wonderful art shows in 2023. During the first half of the year, shows included the whimsical illustrations of Pamela Hanks, watercolor paintings by award-winning artist Richard Raicik, the paintings and photography of Linda Tomaiuolo, and a variety of works by talented students from Portland Middle School.

In August, the Portland Historical Society and the library collaborated on a celebration of the art of Portland 19th century maritime painter John Wells Stancliff. The fall season brought a show highlighting the talents of Portland Library's own—art by staff members, Library Board members and FPL Executive Board members. The show was a multimedia extravaganza that included not only paintings and photography but also handicrafts, woodworking, published novels, and exquisite bridal gowns.

# FPL Book Sales - All Year Long!

Many of you may have recently attended the Friends' **Fall Book Sale**, which took place at the library from October 20-22. It's our signature event of the year, and we are so grateful to the hundreds of members and area residents who come out to support FPL, as well as the dozens of volunteers who help make this major undertaking possible.

But you can buy quality books at bargain prices every day in the Friends' Second Hand Prose Book Sale area of the library. We have mysteries, general fiction, non-fiction, romance, young adult and children's books, and DVDs. Many items are like new and would make great gifts. Hardcover books sell for \$2.00 and trade paperbacks cost \$1.00. DVDs, mass market paperbacks, books for children and young adults, and discarded books from the library's collection all sell for only \$0.50 each. New treasures arrive each week.

FPL also holds several targeted book sales in the Book Sale area throughout the year. Next up is the Holiday Book Store, our month-long sale of gift quality used books including adult and children's holiday books, which begins on Monday, December 4th. During June and July, patrons can stock up on paperback books for their vacation reading at the annual Books for the Beach sale. At various times throughout the year, we often have a large inventory of discarded library books.

All proceeds from FPL book sales benefit programs funded by the Friends, including DVD purchases, the Museum Pass Program, Books for Babies Program, Summer Reading Programs, and the purchase of early literacy software for the library.

## **FPL Funds Programs for Children, Teens and Families**

In 2023, The Friends of the Portland Library budgeted \$27,000 for library programs that benefit Portland citizens of all ages. From infants to seniors, FPL seeks to enrich the lives of all Portland residents. We are especially proud, however, of the contributions that our organization makes to library programs supporting children, teens and families. Through these programs, we hope to foster in Portland's young people a love of learning, community and libraries that will last a lifetime.

FPL's "Books for Babies" program targets Portland's tiniest citizens. Through this program, every new Portland baby can receive a free kit that includes a high-quality board book, a welcome packet for the library's 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten program, a Baby's First Library Card, and brochures that provide families with tips on how to raise a child who loves reading and writing. The Library's Museum Pass Program (funded entirely by the Friends) allows families to visit many local museums and attractions for free or at significantly reduced admission. For families with younger children, we offer passes to Lutz Children's Museum, Beardsley Zoo, and the New England Carousel Museum. Families who wish to explore Connecticut's rich history can choose from passes to Mystic Seaport, Connecticut River Museum and The Mark Twain House. And, since it's never too early to instill a love of art in a child, why not plan a family trip to The Eric Carle Museum of Picture Book Art, Wadsworth Atheneum, New Britain Museum of American Art, or Florence Griswold Museum? FPL funds the entire cost of the library's Summer Reading Programs, along with a wide variety of programs for children, teens and families held throughout the year. This year's offerings have included a traveling touch tank, a bicycle stunt show, a comic mime, and programs on mindfulness, snow leopards, cooking, music and art. In addition, FPL financed the wonderful ocean scene created by talented local artist Aleksandra "Ola" Rucz on the library's windows. We also pay for the program supplies, craft materials and snacks for the library's story time programs and all programs for children and teens. And FPL funds the full cost of important software that promotes literacy in young children. All told, FPL budgets \$11,000 for these fun and educational programs.

Last year, FPL expanded its support of early literacy programs with the purchase of an AWE Learning All-in-One workstation. The station engages young children with entertaining games that focus on math, reading, science, music and art. These games assist with school readiness, improve fine motor skills, and help build computer skills in children who might not have devices at home. We hope this station will be enjoyed by countless preschoolers for many years to come.

Last, but certainly not least, FPL funds the purchase of books for holiday gift baskets given to families served by the Portland Food Bank. Each year, FPL provides hundreds of high-quality, age-appropriate books for infants, children and teens. In this small way, FPL is proud to support the efforts of Ruth Maio (Director of the Portland Food Bank) as she works tirelessly to make Portland a stronger community.

Of course, FPL continues to support many other programs for library patrons of all ages. We fund the library's impressive DVD collection and purchase many e-books and e-audiobooks at a total budgeted cost of \$9,000 for 2023. FPL finances the Library Staff Appreciation program, artist receptions, and adult programs throughout the year on such diverse topics as beekeeping and Rosie the Riveter.

## **Summer Reading Program Goes "Swimmingly"**

If you visited Portland Library this summer, you couldn't help but notice the beautiful ocean scenes on the library's windows. The scenes, painted by talented local artist Aleksandra "Ola" Rucz, introduced visitors to the theme for this year's Summer Reading Program--Oceans of Possibilities. Once inside, the Summer Reading Program offered a full slate of fun and adventure for all participants from toddlers to seniors.

The library held 43 different programs for kids, teens, adults, and families throughout the summer, and 1,304 people attended these programs. Of course, as always, the centerpiece of the Summer Reading Program was books, and lots of reading was going on in Portland this summer. Children and teens (362 participants) read 20 minutes or more for a total of 7,716 reading days! Prizes included books, shells to adopt, mermaid pens, assorted plush toys, games, and tickets for special end-of-summer raffles.

The adults did plenty of reading themselves. Fifty-five patrons participated in the Adult Summer Reading Program, reading a total of 130,292 pages. Twenty-seven patrons logged more than 2,000 pages while one participant read almost 15,000 pages! For the seventh straight year, our Adult Summer Reading Program participants were "reading for a cause." For every 250 pages read by an adult, FPL donated money toward funding instrument rental scholarships for two deserving Brownstone Intermediate School students for the 2023-2024 school year.

FPL is very pleased that, through the generous support of our many loyal members, we were once again able to pay the full cost of the library's Summer Reading Program. Our funding covered the cost of all events, the Brownstone instrument scholarships, the window mural, and all prizes, program supplies and refreshments. A big "Thank You" to our FPL members for making all this possible. Thank you also to Jenn Renk, Patty Ballou and Beth Kauczka of Portland Library for planning and running fun and creative programs--and to the 33 teen volunteers who assisted them!

# **Adult Programs at the Library**

Many of the programs at the Portland Library focus on children, teens and families, but there are plenty of adult-oriented activities too, including these ongoing programs:

Reference Librarian Michele Grzejszczak leads the library's longestrunning book club, which reads a variety of genres including thrillers, suspense, fantasy, science fiction and historical fiction by authors from around the world.

#### "Talk About Books" Book Club - First Tuesday at 1 pm.

JJ Smith, a former educator, selects a book and facilitates discussion.

#### Mystery Lovers Book Club - Third Tuesday at 1 pm.

Led by Reference Librarian Beth Kauczka, this club focuses on mysteries written by established and new authors.

#### Movies in the Afternoon – Second Wednesday at 1 pm

#### **Knifty Knitters - Saturdays at 10 am.**

Join beginner and experienced knitters for a fun and informal get together.

In addition to these regularly scheduled programs, Portland Library holds adult-oriented events throughout the year. This year's selection included paint parties, drumming circles and programs on fall bird migration, Taverns of Connecticut, the Civilian Conservation Corps, Katharine Hepburn, and the British Invasion. FPL funds each of these one-time programs and purchases the DVDs and snacks for Movies in the Afternoon, at a total budgeted cost of \$3,000 for 2023.
